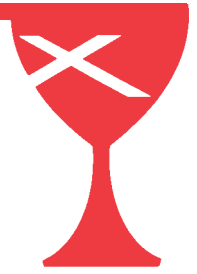

Growing up at Park Manor Christian Church in Chicago, the worship service would always include Anthems and Hymns. There were several hymns that I particularly enjoyed that were based on scripture and often revolved around someone's life experience. One of my favorite hymns is "It is Well With My Soul." The Hymn is written from a place of deep faith by Horatio Spafford following the death of his son and daughters. "When peace like a river attendeth my way, When sorrows like sea billows roll, Whatever my lot, Thou hast taught me to say It is well, it is well with my soul." For some these past 24 months have been just as traumatic, but I believe people of faith who know that Love Remains can declare – It is well with my soul. And as suggested by Howard Thurman, the African-American Theologian, find the growing edges.

They say it only takes a little faith to move a mountain / Well good thing / A little faith is all I have / Right now / But God, when You choose / To leave mountains unmovable / Oh give me the strength to be able to sing / It is well with my soul.

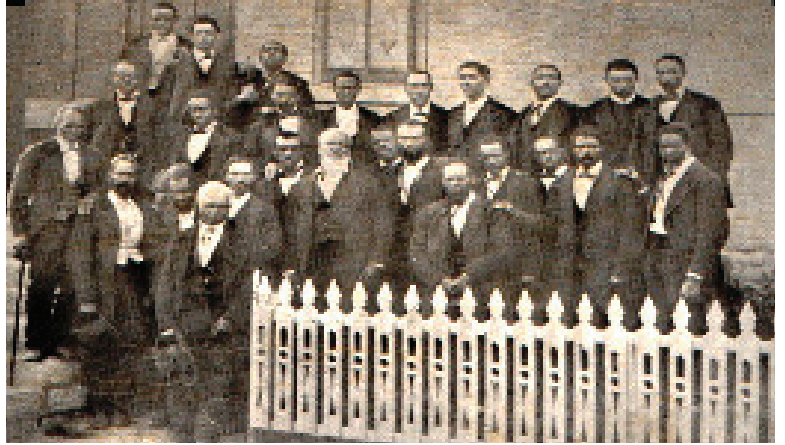

The Kentucky Christian Missionary Convention 1872

A Historic note 2022

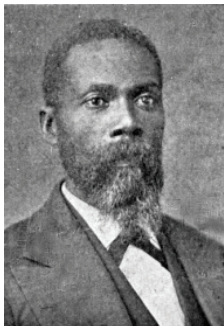
Records of the 1959 National Christian Missionary Convention note the Kentucky Christian Missionary Convention (KCMC) consisting of 15 preachers serving 30 congregations with a combined total of 2,109 members; only 3 of those preachers were considered full-time. The Convention was organized in 1873 as a means of “strengthening weaker churches.” This gathering of all black congregations met annually to educate and train Christian leaders. Many of the preachers who served in those early years were former slaves who had been taught to read by their slave owners and “groomed” to preach. The congregations who had their beginnings prior to 1864 have similar stories. As slaves they worshipped in a white congregation, often seated in the balcony. At some point they were allowed to worship on their own in a location provided and supported by the white congregation.



During the mid 1900’s, the KCMC congregations maintained communication throughout the year by publishing the Kentucky Christian Evangel, a quarterly newsletter. In 1948, as the Convention celebrated 75 years of service, this picture of the first Convention delegates was published in the Kentucky Christian Evangel.

Of the 30 congregations noted in the 1959 records, 12 are still active. They are: Historic Second Christian Church, Midway (since 1832); East Second Street Christian Church, Lexington (1851); East Maple Street Christian Church, Nicholasville; Fairview Christian Church, Sharpsburg; Broadway Christian Church, Germantown; Broadway Christian Church, Winchester (1868); Seventh Street Christian Church, Paris (1868); Second Christian Church, Lawrenceburg (1869); High Street Christian Church, Mt. Sterling (1874); Hill Street Christian Church, Louisville; Robbins Street Christian Church, Covington; and Second Christian Church, Mayfield.

A review of the histories of KCMC congregations reveals that, between 1850-1950 preachers, Alexander Campbell; Preston Taylor; H.M. Ayers; Stafford Campbell; I. H. Moore; R. E. Hathaway; George Letton; and others served as pastor for more than one congregation, on more than one occasion.

I'm new around here, so let me introduce myself. I am Rev. Molly Smothers and I am serving as the Acting Associate Regional Minister here in Kentucky until 31 October. I am a graduate of Transylvania University and Lexington Theological Seminary. I've served as senior minister at Republican Christian Church, First Christian Church in Mount Sterling, and First Christian Church in Morehead. For the last six years I transitioned to interim work with congregations in Independence, Owensboro, Georgetown, Harrodsburg, Maysville, and Flemingsburg. My husband Leon and I live on a farm in Rowan County. I am excited about this new calling and working with the Rev. Dr. Gillett and the rest of the staff.

One of my responsibilities is working with the group heading up our Reconciliation ministry. Their work is so crucial, especially in these times. Their commitment to this work moving forward is grounded in prayer and meditation, and this is evident.

Reconciliation is the branch of the larger Regional ministry that oversees "Seeing the Face of God in Each Other," one of our essential components in Standing. Those who are currently facilitating those sessions offered through the Region are well trained and committed to the effort. However, more trainers are needed. Many of us who are ordained have already participated in the training and have benefitted from the education. Is being trained to be a facilitator something you might be interested in pursuing? Would you make that a matter of prayer? There will be more information about this in the weeks to come.

If you are a clergyperson and have not yet been a part of the "Seeing the Face of God in Each Other" workshop, there are additional times scheduled for the next couple of months – February 16 and 17, and March 18 and 19. You may sign up at ccinky.net.

Additionally, the Reconciliation Ministry Team has formed three task forces, two of which are set up to carry this work forward into our congregations and Lexington Theological Seminary. You will be hearing more about that in the weeks to come. The third task force is reaching out to those who have already taken the training and might wish to be a part of a small group to further conversation and implementation. There are many other aspects of my job that you will hear more about in the months to come. I will be visiting congregations to connect and see what churches are doing and how they are faring during this unusual time in our lives. West Area News Partnering Together in Recovery

In their response to the December 10-11 and January 1 tornadoes, churches in the West Area are working in partnership to share God's love with our neighbors:

First Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) in Princeton is hosting work day Thursdays at noon each week through November 17, 2022. They are inviting other churches to join their members and youth to do a variety of tasks and tornado relief work. They intend to post the week's work plans and location on their Facebook page ("First Christian Church, Disciples of Christ, Princeton, Kentucky") by Tuesday at 4pm prior to each Thursday, and they plan to offer both more and less physical tasks. As of this writing, they have hosted workers from **Berea Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) near Russellville**, **Cadiz Christian Church (Disciples of Christ)**, **Liberty Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) near Hopkinsville**, and **First Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) of Madisonville**.

Millbrooke Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) in Hopkinsville and **Ilsley Christian Church (Disciples of Christ)** partnered to provide needed items to those impacted by the tornado. Members of Millbrooke collected the items and delivered them to the church in Ilsley, who distributed them to neighbors and family members in the Ilsley and Barnsley areas outside of Dawson Springs.

Second Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) of Mayfield hosted several item distribution days in their fellowship hall and church parking lot. On December 21, they welcomed members from **First Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) of Carbondale (Ill.)**, **First Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) of Du Quoin (Ill.)**, **First Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) of Murray**, and **First Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) of Paducah** to receive, sort, and distribute trucks of water and other needed items.

Growing an Idea

Grass and weeds adorned the grounds beside our church of stone and stained glass. What's wrong with that picture? Unwilling to accept a vacant landscape an idea began to germinate in my heart. Why not grow a garden?

Upon approval I picked up my shovel and began to dig. Immediately I was met with the tough resistance of hard compacted clay soil unwilling to budge. I dug anyway tilling the ground for the coming plants until more resistance tried to halt my work. Unknown to me when the garden idea formed there were buried rocks and bricks from the previous church which had burned directly beneath where some plants would go. They would be difficult to unearth. At this point quitting would have been easier. But why should I allow these obstacles to ruin what I believed was a good idea? I wrestled the obstructions out of the ground so the plants could grow well. From horseflies to humidity the ongoing resistance wanted me to give up but my resolve was stronger. The desire for a garden captivated my heart so much I met every opposing challenge believing in the value of a garden regardless of the cost or my comfort. I kept digging, planting, mulching, weeding and watched a garden slowly emerging. Like a growing seed the idea began to blossom into ruby red roses and lavender lilies, bright crimson tulips and golden daffodils.

Sitting on the church steps sipping coffee one day I noticed a bee coming to a flower for nectar. The bee passed the word and later brought his buddies to enjoy the free food. I imagined the nectar being transformed into honey for someone's breakfast toast enhancing our connection with nature. Drivers who never graced the inside of our church slowed down to admire a rainbow of colors that spoke more vividly of creation's beauty than one of my sermons. Children in the church grew in love for the flowers as they plucked the blooms for bouquets and had their picture taken. A member's idea to honor and remember loved ones led to a "Memory Garden" of donated flowers. A neighbor dropped by unannounced to offer butterflies she raised that quickly settled in and made the garden their own. Like the tree sheltering birds in the parable of the mustard seed the idea had become for others a home.

I look back to various turning points in the garden's development when the outcome was uncertain as in when voracious weeds tried to overwhelm the flowers. If I had quit the garden, its blessings would not be here today. The garden continues to grow.
