GATHERED TOGETHER

"All nations will river toward it, people from all over set out for it. They'll say, "Come, let's climb God's Mountain, go to the House of the God of Jacob. He'll show us the way he works so we can live the way we're made." Isaiah 2:1a-2 MSG

I am excited and looking forward to our Great Gathering (August 1-3) in Mt. Sterling, affectionately known as the biennial Regional Assembly.

"Go Grow Inspire"

It will be a time of learning, worship, fellowship, relationship building and much more. I believe there is something holy about gathering together worshiping our triune God as a community.

As a child, I was compelled to attend gatherings of believers. Later in life, I went through a stage where I chose not to attend such gatherings. All these years later, I know that my thinking was unclear about attending church gatherings. Maybe my decision was the result of compulsory attendance as a child, maybe I was sorting out my own feelings and needed to come to grips with my faith - whatever the reason, I did not attend. However, there came a point in my life when no one could keep me away from the gathered body. Upon returning to the body of believers, I found something electric about how the Spirit of God would hover amongst the gathered saints. There was something inexplicable that happened differently in the gathered body than it did when I was by myself. I believe religion in America is in a stage where people are working their way back from individual journeys to reassemble as the gathered community.

How we execute this in the new reality of in-person, online or hybrid worship will be important. We can no longer compel people to gather in a single fashion nor can we manipulate or guilt people into coming physically to religious gatherings. We must learn to bear witness to how the Kin-Dom is transformed when the gathered body gets together. Believers gathering is essential to our growth spiritually, our discipleship, and our witness. Learning to do this anew so our individual journeys of

faith can intersect as the community is our challenge.

Gathering together now only encourages and strengthens our walk, but it also nurtures our relationships.

As I close, I echo Diana Butler Bass's suggestion in her book Christianity After Religion: what looks like the end of Christendom may be the beginning of another Great Awakening. "Awakenings begin when old systems break down, in periods of cultural distortion and grave personal stress, when we lose faith in the legitimacy of our norms, the viability of our institutions and the authority of our leaders in church and state. A critical disjunction in how we perceive ourselves, God, and the world arises from the stress. The end of the old opens the way for the new."

Come Let Us Go and Grow and be Inspired as we Climb the Mountain of God!

It remains an honor and a privilege to have been called to serve clergy, laity and the nearly 200 congregations that make up the Christian Church in Kentucky during a very challenging and yet exciting period in our history.



he Rev. Dr. Leah D. Schade is the Associate Professor of Preaching and Worship at Lexington Theological Seminary in Lexington, Kentucky. An ordained Lutheran minister (ELCA) for more than twenty years, Leah earned both her MDiv and PhD degrees from the Lutheran Theological Seminary at Philadelphia (now United Lutheran Seminary). She has pastored three Pennsylvania congregations in suburban, urban, and rural contexts. Her book, Preaching in the Purple Zone: Ministry in the Red-Blue Divide (Rowman & Littlefield, 2019), explores how clergy and congregations can address controversial social issues using nonpartisan, biblically-centered approaches and deliberative dialogue. She is also the author of Creation-Crisis Preaching: Ecology, Theology, and the Pulpit (Chalice Press, 2015), as well as For the Beauty of the Earth, and several other books. She is also the EcoPreacher blogger for Patheos. Dr. Schade received the Kentucky Council of Churches award in 2019.












What Happens at Those District Ministers' Meetings, Anyway?

The District 1, 2, and 3 meetings have been held for decades. In early 2020, we added a fourth meeting in the evenings on Zoom, responding to the unique challenges of bi-vocational and part-time ministers. Often, Dr. Lon Oliver or Dr. Kris Bentley from Lexington Theological Seminary will join us and share vocational research and resources with this group.

Two groups meet in person - one over a brown bag lunch and the other occasionally go out afterward for some "holy guacamole" - and two meet on Zoom to accommodate the geographical spread. We start by checking in, usually laced with poking fun at each other just a little bit. Laughter is good for the soul, and it feels great to be with people who understand the challenges that we face in our callings.

For each meeting, I bring a guided conversation topic or invite a special guest to share with us about their work or ministry. The topics are chosen to address arising needs, contextual concerns, or just fun things of interest to us. Every year, we spend some dedicated time focusing on clergy self-care and mental health topics.

We've had great special guest presenters like Joyce Adkins from the Kentucky Poor People's Campaign, Regional Minister Rev. Dr. Donald K. Gillett, II, Taylor Kimberlain from Lexington Theological Seminary, Rev. Dr. Paul Moore from Hospice of Western Kentucky, and Rev. Sarah Renfro from Pension Fund.

In our discussions around the table or across Zoom, we get to see the diversity and variety of our beautiful Disciples of Christ church. We get to learn from one another and get a sense of how big God really is. When crises arise in our ministries or families, we have friends to call. And I love seeing how they take what they've learned in these gatherings and share it with their congregations. My hope is that these meetings enrich us all and make us all stronger, more connected, and more equipped to live into God's call as a Church.

We share resources - curriculum, sermon prep, webinars and opportunities. We discuss upcoming events in the region. We close with a special time of sharing joys and concerns for ourselves, our families, our churches, vour communities, and our world. We pray for all that we've named and left unnamed.

Our district ministers' meetings are not glamorous or formal, but they are real, authentic, and precious. Thank you, churches, for supporting your pastors as they come to these meetings.
